Financial Report

The Cathedral College Alumni Association continues to be on a sound financial footing.

Our cash balance consistently remains in the low \$20,000 range. As of March 31,2023 the bank balance stood at approximately \$23,800. Our finances are structured such that the Association dinners, currently held twice annually, are self funded by attendees. The scholarship award, currently \$3,000, that we make annually to a deserving seminarian studying for the priesthood in the Archdiocese of NY comes entirely from members dues.

Similar to attendance at Mass, we have a demographic issue in that many of our members are "graying". We need to attract younger alumni in order to sustain the organization into the foreseeable future. Lessons from West End Avenue

I had a lot of time on my hands in 2021 and with the encouragement of Jim Manning, Prep '60, I spent much of that time in the Corrigan Library at St. Joseph's Seminary creating an inventory of the senior Cathedral publication *The Chimes*. From its first issue in 1909 through the final volume published in 1968, it really is a time capsule exposing the thoughts and interests of Cathedral's alumni and, consequently, of many of the priests we knew either from our parishes or as our instructors.

Sadly, the Chimes failed to survive the transition from Manhattan to Douglaston. Although I haven't quite completed the inventory yet, seeing the names of our professors and learning of their own interests at about the same age I was when they taught me was, in some ways, like visiting the past. Dean of Discipline Jimmy Griffin (can you really take a D of D seriously if you can call him "Jimmy?") the sports editor (Volume 36). Our freshman English teacher, Fr. Tom Gartland, he of the "five page" punishment compositions fame, wrote about Thomas Jefferson, "The Great American" in the Spring, 1943 issue. That class, by the way, produced two bishops, Austin "Archy" Vaughn and John Mescall, both of whom were contributors to the Chimes. Vaughn, in fact, subsequently became a Chimes editor. There's French professor Fr. Maurice Carroll's "Classical Katzenjammer Kid" in the Spring, 1949 edition as well as contributions by Fr. Oscar Lynch (one ironically entitled "Too Much Talk") and poetry by Fr. Joe Nebesky. Carroll also went on to edit the magazine. In addition to learning of the interests of my professors at my age, I also saw the names of many of the parish priests of my youth scattered throughout the various issues.

I have yet to do a "deep dive" into the earliest issues, but a quick perusal reinforces the Chimes as a snapshot of New York clergy and their times. Contemporary issues offered reflected the influence of World Wars, economic woes and racial awakenings. I encourage anyone who can to revisit their years at Cathedral through the eyes of *The Chimes* by visiting the Corrigan Library. Arrangements can be made by contacting the librarian, Mr. Connor Flatz, at cflatz@corriganlibrary.org. The association has also begun the process of digitizing many issues and posting them on Jim Manning's "Wall."

Our examination of the collection will be complete in a month or so and copies of the inventory will be made available to anyone who wants one by contacting *Memorare* or the association directly.
