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Coach Larry Byrnes dies at age 82

Lawrence T. Byrnes, Sr., of Somerset NJ, passed peacefully in the early morning hours of July 3, 2023 surrounded by his loving family.

Coach Larry was born December 9, 1940. in Cold Spring, New York and raised in Garrison, New York as the 6th of 11 children. He graduated from Manhattan College in 1962. He then began his teaching career at Cathedral

Prep High School in New York City while simultaneously earning his Masters Degree from Montclair State University in 1976.

In 1976, Larry started his tenure at The Collegiate School for Boys in NYC as a teacher/coach and then as Athletic Director, retiring in 2006. During his career, "Coach" touched innumerable lives as a varsity basketball and baseball coach and teacher. As the Collegiate Varsity Basketball Coach, Larry won 461 games and lost only 148 for an amazing .757 winning percentage, earning him the honor of being a 2006 inductee into the New York State Basketball Hall of Fame.





Archbishop Balvo visits New York

Archbishop Charles Balvo (Cathedral College '72, Cathedral Prep '68) has

served for 36 years in the Vatican's diplomatic service and is the Apostolic Nunzio to Australia since January 2022. He generally returns to the New York area annually to visit family and renew connections with classmates. On July 10, Archbishop Balvo and 14 classmates (Msgr. Richard Ahlemeyer, Msgr. Thomas Costa, Msgr Fernando Ferrarese, Rev. Michael McGee, Msgr. Robert Romano, Rev. William Slat-



er, Robert Ambrose, Albert Carbuto, Malachy Corrigan, Martin Heslin, Patrick Martin, John McGlynn, Thomas McGrail, and Joseph Rodriguez) met for dinner at Jonathan's Restaurant in New Hyde Park, NY. The evening was filled with stories of reminiscence, updates on current doings, and good cheer.

Archbishop Balvo has had a rich career in service to the Church. After studying theology at the Pontifical North American College in Rome, he was ordained as a priest of the Archdiocese of New York in 1976 and served in two upstate parishes for six years. He then studied cannon law receiving a Licentiate and a Doctorate of Canon Law. In 1987, he joined the Vatican's diplomatic service and had diplomatic postings to Latin America, the Baltic States, Africa, and the Middle East.

In 2005, Archbishop Balvo was ordained to the episcopacy by Cardinal Egan and received his first appointment as an Apostolic Nuncio, to New Zealand and the islands of the Pacific. He has also served as the papal ambassador to Kenya and South Sudan and to the Czech Republic before his current posting in Australia.

in brief remarks at the dinner with classmates, Archbishop Balvo said that even after having dwelled for many years in so many places throughout the world in service to the Church, his home and heart remains in New York with his family members and community of classmates from Cathedral Prep and College. That sentiment was on full display in the shared camaraderie of the evening.
