This letter is to recommend SAs MARTIN V. HALE and JAMES M. MANNING be granted Incentive Awards for their outstanding performance in captioned matter. This case involved the theft of over \$15,000,000.00 in US Treasury bills from the Chase Manhattan Bank, New York City, on 11/5/73.

Information was developed by a Los Angeles informant that Treasury bills were possibly available through an individual subsequently identified as QUINTILLO A. ALONZO in Cleveland. Ohio.

Information was received late in the afternoon of 3/27/74, that Los Angeles informant and subject ARTHUR ANDREWS were arriving from Miami, Florida, to meet with ALONZO to negotiate purchase of the \$5,000,000 worth of Treasury bills. Although this matter is assigned to a Resident Agent in the Cleveland Division and not SA HALE, he immediately organized the surveillance to cover the arrival of the above-named parties at the airport and identified ALONZO. He familiarized himself with the voluminous file so the Cleveland aspect of the investigation could be intelligently handled.

From the arrival of the Los Angeles informant that evening until the recovery of the \$4,000,000 worth of stocks and bonds the following day, and the arrest of four subjects, this matter proceeded at a whirlwind pace. SA HALE afforded a great deal of guidance and control to this highly place Los Angeles informant. As a result of SA HALE's outstanding organization, four subjects were arrested without incident and \$4,000,000 in securities were recovered in tact.

SA HALE participated in and assisted in the coordination of the actual arrest, which were smoothly and efficiently carried out despite the fact that this was a potentially dangerous situation as several of the subjects were armed as they normally would have been in an anticipation of a "rip off" in any transaction involving large sums of money.

In addition, SA HALE maintained liaison with the USA's office and obtained necessary authorization at the crucial moment.



To obtain probable cause for entry of the motel room where the arrest was made, it was necessary to conduct a consensual monitoring operation on emergency authority which called for a certain type of installation which was effected by SA MANNING. This was obviously difficult and daring as ALONZO and his body guard, FEIGENBAUM, had been in and about the motel, including up to the rooms in question and back to the coffee shop in the motel with the source. However, SA MANNING handled his assignments under pressure and it was through his highly skilled technical operation that the Agents were able to enter the rooms on cue so that the arrests could be made with the Treasury bills in plain view and they could be recovered without a search warrant.

SA MANNING handled all of his assignments in record time after he was first notified of their necessity.

In view of the above comments, it is felt that the Agents are most deserving of Incentive Awards in this matter.

GENERAL INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION (GID) GJF/pdb 4/22/74 ADDENDUM

GID concurs with recommendation of SAC, Cleveland, that performance of SA Martin V. Hale is deserving of an incentive award. SA Hale organized surveillance of a Los Angeles informant who came to Cleveland for a securities buy. He also assisted in the guidance of the Los Angeles informant and assisted in the coordination of the arrests of four subjects which resulted in the recovery of four million dollars in stolen securities. GID does not concur with recommendation of SAC, Cleveland, that performance of SA James M. Manning for the installation of a monitoring device is such to deserve an incentive award, but recommends individual letter of commendation. GID also concurs with recommendation of SAC, Cleveland, that Supervisor John Davis Roberson receive a letter of commendation for his overall supervision of this matter and that SA Hugh A. Cochran of the Miami Office who was in Cleveland working in an undercover capacity receive a letter of commendation. receive a letter of commendation. SAC, Cleveland, recommends SAs Hale and Manning for incentive awards, Supervisor Roberson and SA Cochran (of the Miami Office) for individual letters of commendation, as well as a general letter of commendation to SAC, Cleveland, commending through him efforts of other participating personnel.

General Investigative Division (GID) concurs with all recommendations of SAC, Cleveland, with the exception that GID feels that SA Manning would be more suitably recognized by an individual letter of commendation in lieu of an incentive award for his installation of a monitoring device in this investigation.

Administrative Division concurs with all recommendations of GID with the exception that it is felt that SA Hale would be more suitably recognized by an individual letter of commendation in lieu of an incentive award as it has been determined from a review of his personnel file that he received on April 16, 1974, a withingrade salary increase in connection with his annual performance rating for the manner in which he discharged his obligations for the period April 1, 1973 to March 31, 1974. Inasmuch as SA Hale is being recommended for recognition for activity which occurred within this period of time in instant matter, it is felt that the within-grade salary increase is sufficient recognition for his services, however, Administrative Division feels that SA Hale is deserving of an individual letter of commendation.





Complying with the letter's instructions, Exxon placed an advertisement in a Columbus newspaper with a post office box number for further contacts.

A letter sent to the box in April set the money exchange date for Aug. 31, but that was moved up to Aug. 3 in a later letter, Mr. Fehl said.
